The introduction of sex education into the public and parochial school systems has posed a particular obligation on parents to see that there programs are properly implemented. SEX EDUCATION—

TODAY'S HOT POTATO

Parents should be the chief sexual educators — all agree on th's. De facto, most parents neglect this responsibility. The Church can and should complement the work of parents. De facto they are still fumbling around for the best program.

To make the hot potato even hotter there are two big winds fanning the flames. One wind is soft: Sex is life; the other wind is loud: Sex is sin. Neither gives the whole potato. And wholesomeness is what we want. A whole sexual program will develop Positive Attitudes — the blending of facts and values e.g.

- I. Maleness and femaleness.
- Body and role differences (as the French say: "Thank God for the difference.")
- 3. Respect for the power of life itself — Sex is good! But, good for what?
- 4, Threefold sexual relationship:
 - a. To love.
 - b. To marriage.
 - c. To God.

God must be included in any program of sex education!! The Knights of Columbus programs of down with V.D.; dirty books; bad pictures; immoral acts; is fine as far as it goes. But it is not a positive program! Up with: Whole sexual education; good literary habits, etc.

FOURTH DEGREE NEWLY INITIATED SIR KNIGHTS



Commodore Porter Discusses America Cup Races



Shown above, being congratulated by Lecturer B. Warren Hehl, is Brother Knight of Union Council Ernest E. Porter who presented an exceptionally fine discussion and movie on the America Cup Races. Tracing the history of the America Cup Mr. Porter stated that yachting got started in a modern sense in Holland under King Charles II. In 1720 the first Yacht Club was formed, followed in 1775 with the formation of the Cumberland Yacht Club, which through a series of amalgamations became the Royal Yacht Squadron.

In 1851 the New York Yacht Club issued a challenge to the Royal Squadron and entered a yacht called the America. This yacht was much faster than the competition and won the 100 Guinea Cup which was deeded to the New York Yacht Club, and became known as the "AMERICA" Cup. Eighteen times the British have tried to win — unsuccessfully. One of the most aggressive contenders was Britisher Sir Thomas Lipton who five times tried to win the Cup between 1899 and 1930.
